Boog's gray muzzle, short-cropped ears, lumpy face, and crooked tail told the story of a dog who had seen some rough times. At nearly 10 years old, Boog arrived at our shelter unneutered, with chronic ear infections, and in need of a home where he could be the only pet.

The kennels were a stressful environment for Boog, so we decided to transition him to an office foster situation. Here, he revealed his calm and easygoing nature and soon became a favorite among the staff.

However, as the months passed without any interest from potential adopters, Boog's spirits began to fade. It became clear that what he truly needed was a foster home. Enter Trip, Boog's foster dad, who stepped in and soon discovered the remarkable spirit of this gentle dog.



Teonna was found wandering on a busy street by some kind-hearted people. They noticed her hind leg was in bad shape and brought her to us. X-rays showed her ankle was broken and too close to the joint to fix. To prevent her from having chronic pain, we amputated her leg.

Teonna handled the surgery like a champ and was soon ready for a foster-to-adopt home. This threeweek period is for pets and adopters who may need a bit more care or support from our staff before making it official.

Maggie and Alex saw Teonna's photo online and knew they had to meet her. They were smitten within minutes and took her home with instructions to limit her activity while she healed. After a re-check and suture removal, Teonna, now called Toad, showed her true colors.

Toad quickly became the boss of her new home — running, climbing, and even taking over her canine brother's crate. Her missing leg didn't slow her down one bit! Her new family loves her spunky personality, even if she is a little bossy.
